History

- In North America, skiing seams to receive more bad Press than any other activities when it comes to accidents and fatalities.
- Michael Kennedy (Kennedy family) Sony Bonno in the USA (Former actor and signer – Senator).
- Existing Jurisprudence. Coroners recommending to wear a helmet when skiing.



The tendency in North America

- Helmets compulsory for kids taking lessons
- Helmets compulsory in Snow Parks
- Free Riders are wearing it (Cool things to do)
- Government legislation up in the air
- Groups of neuro surgeons on a personal mission
- In the USA and Canada each State Province is free to implement a legislation
- Parents are supporting the compulsory helmets

Industry concerns

- *Liability*
- If you rent helmets & if they are not available
- Type of helmet Maintenance Hygiene Adjustment – Cost – Inventory – Wear/damages
- Perception that the sport is dangerous and decline of participant
- Added cost for participants
- False confidence of safety Skiers tend to ski faster
- Most Ski Resorts opposed to compulsory Helmets





F.I.S

- Compulsory helmet for training and racing in all speed events
- Research has demonstrated that a helmet is offering protection as long as the speed is inferior to 15km per hour
- F.I.S has to approved the different helmets
- Many helmets not approved
- Ski clubs: Helmets Compulsory

Comparison between frequency of skiing injuries & other recreational activities between 1993-2000



Number of injuries 5 to 14 years old (1 year)



Skiing is in 21th position



Fatalities

- National Ski Areas Association (NSAA) an association of ski area operators found that during the 2002 season, a total of 45 fatalities were recorded out of 54.5 million skier visits, a fatality rate of 0.83 per million.
- During that same period of time bicycling and swimming had a 5 times greater fatality rate than skiing.
- Therefore the statistics clearly demonstrate that skiing has a lower injury-fatality rate than many school activities such as basketball, soccer and volleyball.
